McCallum-Cameron House: 2226 Old Montreal Road Cumberland

According to family tradition, Mary Cameron, eldest daughter of John Cameron and Elizabeth McNair (married Archibald McCallum) was given the family home at the top of Spring Hill. It was a stone house and was called after that the McCallum House. David Farmer Sr., then his son Carleton Farmer owned this farm. This magnificent stone house on top of Spring Hill is now the residence of Mel Clendenan, husband of the late Lorna Farmer, Carleton's daughter.

The Charter President of the Cumberland Branch of the W.I. - Mrs. Ernest Taylor (nee Beatrice Annie Garvock)

Mrs. Taylor was elected Branch President at the first meeting, which was held on July 26, 1937, at the home of Mrs. M.V. McArthur in Cumberland Village. James Garvock (b.1841) and his wife Helen Greig



emigrated from Aberdeen, Scotland to Cumberland Township in 1871 with their son James (1861-1951). James Jr. married Mary Elizabeth Wilson (1869-1940) from Cote St. Charles, Quebec in 1892) and purchased the west half of Lot 4 Con. 6, Cumberland Township in 1885. There they raised 7 girls and 4 boys. Annie, born on Sept. 1, 1897, was the second oldest. In the early 1900's, the Garvock's farmhouse was moved from its original damp location, near French Hill Road, to higher ground further south. The house was enlarged and here, the last four of Annie's siblings were born. Four sisters became school teachers in local schools. Annie stayed home to help her mother with the housework and to look after the younger children. Annie's youngest brother, Greig Wilson Garvock married Iris Norman. Iris is still living on Lot 4, Con. 6. with her son Norman and his partner Peggy Levy, Norm's younger son Scott and his wife Sally Pearson and their children Jamie, Kristopher and Samantha. Annie Garvock, at 23, married Ernie Taylor who was 38, on Aug. 4, 1920. Annie Garvock Taylor became president of the Cumberland W.I. when she had three school-aged children. Their last child was born the next year. (See the Taylor Family history in the previous issue of The Caboose for the family history of the Taylors.)



The Edwards Family

Although our ancestors did not pass on much information about their relatives and where they were born, the Edwards cousins from this area have accumulated the following family history.

William John Edwards, born about 1831, was married to Catherine Rathwell. They lived at Meaford, Ontario, (close to Georgian Bay), and later some of the family moved to the Plantagenet area. William and Catherine Edwards had 8 children born in Quebec and Ontario: Eliza Jane (Elizabeth Jane), Sarah, Mary Anne, Thomas, Margaret, William, John, and Alice.

Eliza Jane remained in Meaford, married John Mackie, and lived on Conc. VII, in St. Vincent Township in Grey County. They had 12 children: Jane, William, Thomas, Catherine Maggie, James Edward, Archibald, Margaret Alice, John Bedford, Ada, Leonard Ross, Milton, and Mary Maretta. John Mackie died March 20, 1910, and his wife, Eliza Jane, died a month later, April 19, 1910. They are buried in Lakeview Cemetery, Meaford.

Sarah Edwards, born about 1852, married Robert McEwan and moved to Winnipeg, Manitoba.

Mary Anne (or Mary) Edwards, born about 1854, married James Fitzpatrick and moved to California, USA.

Thomas, born about 1858, drowned in the Nation River on Oct. 2, 1879.

Margaret Edwards, born about 1860, married Archibald Beaton and they had 2 children, John and Elizabeth. This Elizabeth Beaton married Francis J. Courtney, Sr., of Ottawa. Their only son, Francis Courtney Jr., married Alma Edwards (10), youngest daughter of William and Alice (Watchorn) Edwards. (The Beaton families who live at Cumberland are direct descendants of Thomas Beaton, brother of Archibald.)

Alice Edwards, born May 12, 1867, married Alanson Noakes who came from Silver Creek, Quebec (Buckingham area). They had 6 boys: Rupert, Leonard, William, George, Hamlet (killed in 1917, WWI), and Eldon. The father, Alanson, died, and soon afterwards the mother, Alice, also died when their youngest son, Eldon was born. Tom Hughes, who was married to Alanson's sister, had two daughters. Tom and his wife took the 6 boys. After his wife died, he remarried, but that marriage did not go well and the 6 boys eventually went out on their own, either serving in WWI or settling in Western Canada.

The Edwards Family members that our readers will be most interested in hearing about are those of William John because they were born and raised on

a farm southwest of Cumberland on property that is now known as Lower Saxony Stables, 1572 Frank Kenny Road, Lot C, Conc. 8, Cumberland Twp. There are many descendants from this family living in this area.

William John Edwards, born at Meaford, Ont., June 22, 1862, married Alice Mary Maud Watchorn who was born August 18, 1876. Alice (Watchorn) was raised on a farm on O'Toole Road, north of Innes Road, Lot A, Conc. 7, Cumberland Twp. William Edwards died Jan. 7, 1938, and Alice on Oct. 20, 1946. While farming they raised a family of 5 boys and 5 girls: (1) Ernest (Ernie), (2) Sarah (Sadie), (3) Archibald (Archie), (4) Rosella, (5) Gertrude, (6) Norman, (7) Leslie, (8) Gordon, (9) Mary, and (10) Alma.

(1) William Ernest (Ernie) Edwards, was born July 28, 1892. He married Sarah Mae (Sadie) Wright of West Templeton, Quebec on Dec. 12, 1917 where she was born April 9, 1896. Ernie and Sadie's 4 children were: Gladys Muriel, Lester Wright, Ida Rose, and Lorna. Ernie and Sadie operated a dairy farm west of Cumberland at 1789 Old Montreal Road. Ernie and Sadie both died at home—Ernie, Nov. 25, 1970 and Sadie, Nov. 15, 1975.

Gladys, born Nov. 18, 1918, became a nurse, married Wilfred Sharkey who was born at Cumberland Jan. 28, 1919. Gladys and Wilfred married at Cumberland Aug. 18, 1955. Wilfred continued to operate the family's dairy farm east of Cumberland. They had 2 sons, Earl and David (Judy Pygas) and 3 grandchildren. Wilfred died Nov. 13,

2003. Earl continues to operate the farm at 3325 Old Montreal Rd.

Lester, born July 25, 1921, married Vida Florence Berndt, born Sept. 10, 1930. Lester and Vida married in Ottawa Sept. 28, 1946. They had 3 children: Maureen, Dale and Shirley. Lester operated the dairy farm that his parents established, and Dale continues to raise beef cattle on the farm. Lester died Oct. 13, 1979.

Ida Rose was born June 3, 1923 and died January 8, 1924.

Lorna, born July 23, 1925, married William (Bill) Brown, born May 13, 1926. Lorna and Bill married at Cumberland Aug. 22, 1951. Lorna became a school teacher and artist, teaching at Cumberland and later in Northern Ontario where she met Bill, who was employed as a Stationary Engineer in Domtar Paper Mill in Red Rock, Ont., near Nipigon. They had 3 children: Joel, Jeffrey (deceased in June, 1975), and Jennifer and 2 grandchildren. Lorna and Bill continue to live in Red Rock.

(2) Sarah (Sadie), born Feb. 12, 1894, became a nurse, married William (Bill) Brownell Aug. 11, 1925. They had 1 daughter, Mary Charlotte, and 4 grandchildren. Sadie and Bill both died in Ottawa, Sadie on Sept. 2, 1982 and Bill on July 30, 1979.

Charlotte, born in Ottawa Feb. 27, 1930, married Alexander (Alex) LaRocque on Aug. 6, 1955 in Ottawa. Alex was born Jan. 31, 1924. Charlotte was an employee of the Federal Gov't. in Ottawa and Alex worked at Union Carbide in Toronto. They had 4 children: Margot, Anne, John, Jane, and 2 grandchildren who all live in Toronto.

(3) Archie Edwards, born at Cumberland Dec. 19, 1895, married Bertha May MacEachern Dec. 29, 1923 at Cumberland. Bertha was born Aug. 15, 1902 at Lochabor Bay, Quebec. Archie served overseas in WWI. Their 5 children were: Muriel Enid, Maysie Alice,

Stanley Archibald, Mary Audrey, and Gertrude Gail. Archie and Bertha, along with their family, operated a dairy farm between Orleans and Cumberland at 968 Old Montreal Road from 1923 until 1944, when they bought a farm at 3135 Trim Road, Navan. Archie passed away at his home on June 29, 1974 and Bertha died Jan. 10, 1994 at Sarsfield.

Muriel, born at Cumberland Aug. 5, 1924, married Norman W. Holford in Winnipeg, Manitoba May 10, 1947.

Norman, born Jan. 12, 1916, served in the RCAF during WWII. Later, he and Muriel settled in Onaping, Ont., near Sudbury. They had 5 children: William, Kathleen, Joy, Heather and Jane and 12 grandchildren. Norman died in 2001.

Maysie, born at Cumberland Jan. 7, 1925, married

Garrett Shaw Rivington June 24, 1947 at Navan. Maysie became a teacher and taught in local elementary schools. Garrett served overseas in RCAF during WWII, later operated a dairy farm at 1764 Colonial Road, Navan. Maysie and Garrett had 3 children: Lynda, Elizabeth (Beth), David and 5 grandchildren. Maysie and Garrett both died in Ottawa, Maysie on Sept. 15, 1996 and Garrett Sept. 29, 2002.

Stanley (Stan), born at Cumberland April 29, 1928, married Hilda Mae Sharkey Sept. 24, 1955 in Cumberland. Hilda, born Feb. 27, 1931, was a secretary at a private insurance firm in Ottawa and pianist/organist. Stan continued to operate the family farm with Hilda and their 3 sons: Glen, Ralph (deceased Oct. 1991), and Wayne. Hilda died Feb. 20, 2001. Stan and Hilda had 8 grandchildren.

Mary, born at Cumberland March 3, 1934, married Garnet Douglas Munro on June 11, 1955 at Navan. Garnet, born in Ottawa July 28, 1933, farmed on Innes Road near Blair Road. Mary worked for the

Bank of Canada. They had 4 children: Sheila, Gloria, Scott, Robert and 6 grandchildren.

Gail, born Jan. 16, 1938 in Ottawa, married Robert (Bob) Donald Young at Navan, Aug. 8, 1959. Gail became a teacher in Ontario public schools and a church organist. Bob operates a dairy farm in Arnprior. They had 4 children: Heather (deceased Feb. 1979), Barbara, Blair, Laura and 5 grandchildren.

(4) Rosella Edwards, born Feb. 19, 1898 at Cumberland, married Dan Cameron June 14, 1919. Dan, born at Cumberland June 29, 1886, operated a dairy farm and market garden with Rosella at Fenwick, Ontario. They had 3 children: Evelyn, Donald, Douglas and 7 grandchildren. Rosella died June 9, 1963 and Dan in June, 1968, both at Fenwick.

Evelyn Dorothy, born March 16, 1920, married Blake McPherson and had 7 children: Ronald, Dianne, Robert, Marion, Margaret, Linda, Douglas. Evelyn died in 1964.

Donald Edward Cameron born July 10, 1921, drowned July, 1934 while swimming at Gordon Harbour near Niagara Falls.

Douglas Jack Cameron, born Oct. 21, 1924, married Nettie Grace Hoover. Doug, served in the Army in WWII, worked on the family farm and later operated a general store in Port Colborne, Ont. (no children). Nettie died Nov. 21, 2004 and Doug Feb. 25, 2005, both in Welland, Ontario.

(5) Gertrude Edwards, born at Cumberland Jan. 19, 1901, became a nurse, married Dr. Henry Niles on June 30, 1928 (no children). Both died in an automobile accident in Montana, USA, in August, 1941.

(6) Norman Edwards, born at Cumberland July 8, 1903, married Florence Emma Kennedy March 10, 1926, at Cumberland. Florence, born at Orleans Oct. 16, 1904, farmed with Norman on various farms in Cumberland Twp., and Vankleek Hill, Ontario. For several years, Norman also served as a Councillor and Reeve of Cumberland Township. He and Florence had 7 children: Norman Harold, Ronald William James, Robert Campbell, Helen Norma, Thurlow Myles, Barry Cecil, Alice Florence. Norman died Aug. 19, 1986 at Maxville, Ont., and Florence June 25, 1987 at Cornwall, Ontario.

Harold Edwards, born March 19, 1927, married Virley Gwendolyn Stuart June 5, 1952 in Ottawa. Virley was born at Vars Oct. 21, 1931. Harold was a carpenter and construction superintendent in the Ottawa area, then a teacher at Chesterville, Ontario. They had 4 daughters: Beverly, Linda, Dianne, Sheila and 2 grandchildren.

Ronald Edwards, born Jan. 2, 1929, married Florence Mary Beaton Aug. 22, 1953 at Cumberland.

Florence, born Sept. 13, 1928, became a Registered Nurse. Ronald was employed at E.B. Eddy Forest Products Ltd., Engineering Department, retiring in 1990 after 42 years of service. They had 7 children: Jane, Susan (deceased July, 1980), Ruth, Nancy, Martha, William (Bill), Rachel and 9 grandchildren. Ronald died Oct. 9, 2004.

Robert (Bob) Edwards, born Aug. 9, 1931, married Ceile Margaret MacEachern June 2, 1953 in Ottawa. Ceile was born Oct. 14, 1935. Bob was employed at E.B. Eddy Forest Products Ltd., and the National Research Council, was owner of a Cumberland general store, and later, a real estate salesman /broker. They had 5 children: Barry, Brian (deceased 2005), Sandra, Judy, Karen. Bob and Ceile divorced, and then he married Elizabeth Sally (Fox) Broadworth Aug. 24, 1985.

Helen Edwards, born in Cumberland Oct. 28, 1933, married Robert Edward Lewis Burns at Cumberland Sept. 17, 1955. Robert (Bob), born April 1, 1932 in Ottawa, farmed at 3007 Trim Road, Navan. Helen was a stenographer in the Federal Gov't. They had 6 children: Laurie, Bruce, Bonnie Jean (deceased Jan. 1979), Wallace, Donna, Allan and 8 grandchildren.

Myles Edwards, born May 2, 1936, married Mildred Beatrice Morin in Ottawa, May 28, 1955. Mildred (Milly) was born May 31, 1934. Myles and Milly farmed with his father, then Myles worked for the Ontario Ministry of Transportation and Milly worked for the Federal Gov't. They had 3 children: Heather, Larry, Jimmy and 6 grandchildren.

Barry Cecil Edwards, born July 21, 1939, died Dec. 7, 1939, in a house fire.

Alice Edwards, born in Ottawa May 8, 1944, married William George Anderson at Vankleek Hill Sept. 19, 1964. William (Bill) was born Jan. 28, 1940. Alice became a Registered Nursing Assistant and Bill farmed at Vankleek Hill. They had 3 children: Robert (Robbie), Steven, Christine and 7 grandchildren. Alice died May 20, 2005 in Hawkesbury.

(7) Leslie Edwards, born at Cumberland Jan. 30, 1906, married Mary Frances Chamberlin on April 12, 1941 in Ottawa. Mary was born Sept. 21, 1910 at Poltimore, Quebec. Leslie and Mary operated the Edwards homestead, 1572 Frank Kenny Road, and had 2 children: William Rufus and Joan Elizabeth and 4 grandchildren. Leslie died Sept. 20, 1981 and Mary on April 26, 1989, both in Ottawa.

William (Bill), born Nov. 4, 1943 in Ottawa, married Margaret Elaine Watson on July 15, 1967 at Bearbrook, Ontario. Elaine was born Nov. 8, 1945 in Ottawa and was an office administrator in elementary schools. Bill was employed by Crain-Drummond Inc., in Ottawa for 41 years. They had 2 daughters, Cheryl and Joanne and 2 grandchildren.

Joan, born Jan. 27, 1945 in Ottawa, became a Registered Nurse, married Donald Johnston Rathwell at Cumberland May 18, 1968. Don was born Oct. 29, 1938 in Ottawa. He and Joan operated the family's dairy farm at 1759 Colonial Road, Navan and had 2 children, Scott and Carrie. Scott continues the farming operation.

(8) Gordon Cecil Edwards, born at Cumberland May 14, 1908, married Mary Burwash of Vankleek Hill, Oct. 3, 1936. Mary, born Mar. 25, 1908, was a school teacher. Gordon served in the RCAF in WWII and became a real estate agent in Ottawa. They had twin daughters, Jane Elizabeth and Mary Lynne, born Aug. 20, 1946 and 2 grandsons. Gordon and Mary both died in Ottawa, Gordon on Feb. 6, 1984 and Mary, March 9, 2003.

Jane married Donald Norman Morrison on Aug. 12, 1972. Donald was born on April 13, 1944 and they have 2 sons, Robert and Kenneth.

Mary Lynne married Peter Wilson in August, 1968 (divorced, no children).

(9) Mary Alice Edwards, born at Cumberland Dec. 10, 1910, married Alexander Calder Smith, Sr., on Apr. 17, 1936. Alex was born Aug. 15, 1894. Mary became

a nurse and lived in Ravena, N.Y. USA. They had 2 children: Alexander Calder Jr., and Valerie and 5 grandchildren. Alex and Mary died in Albany, N.Y., Alex in Jan. 1972 and Mary on Sept. 7, 1978.

Alex Jr., born May 23, 1944, married Sandra Beth Montague who was born Dec. 3, 1946. They were married Oct. 20, 1967 and had 4 children: Chad, Dan, Noah, Rachel and 9 grandchildren.

(10) Laura Alma Edwards, born at Cumberland Sept. 23, 1912, married Francis John Courtney in Ottawa, Sept. 1948. Francis was born in Ottawa, Apr. 19, 1923. For several years, Alma worked for the Bank of Canada in Ottawa, and after her marriage, helped her husband operate the F.J. Courtney Furniture Store. They had no children. Alma and Francis died in Ottawa, Alma on July 12, 1995 and Francis, March 13, 1998.

The Edwards Family and their relatives continue to serve the areas of the old Cumberland Township by being active in church, political, community, school, and Navan Fair activities. Their contributions have made this part of Ottawa a better place to live.
